# THE MESSENGER

Fasnacht, Mardi Gras, Fat Tuesday, Ash Wednesday, Lent, Passover, Pascha... what does all this mean?

To really understand any of these words, we need to remember the story of the Exodus. Pharoah and Moses were in a tight power struggle, and our God would prevail. Our people didn't have time to spare, so they went home and celebrated the Pascha, the Passover, where the angel of death passed over all the houses that



were marked with blood from the lamb of their meal. Because time was of the essence, there wasn't time to let the bread rise, and for the Passover meal, the people ate flatbread. In all the homes that didn't have the blood of the lamb on the doorpost, the angel of death killed the firstborn children, including Pharaoh's own son. In his grief Pharoah let all the slaves go, and our people ran as fast as they could.

Our Jewish siblings, remembering our combined history, continue to celebrate Passover with a traditional meal. A meal that doesn't include yeast, because the yeast was the old way, and they were trusting God to do something new. In preparation for the celebration, they clean and scour their homes to make sure there is no yeast hiding in their cupboards. This is also where many Christians bring the practice of giving something up for Lent. In early homes, there would be a party the night before Lent started to make sure everything that contained yeast was removed from the house. There are many forms of this celebration, for German Lutherans it's called Fasnacht and you make sure that all of the yeast (including that used to make beer) is removed from the home. In other Lutheran traditions, they eat pancakes or ebelskivers on the day before Lent starts to eat all the yeast. In each area, there is some sort of food eaten or drank that represents the time before Ash Wednesday, when we all remember that we are created from the dust of the earth and will someday return to that dust.

It makes me wonder about where First is as a people of God. Pastor Duane has walked faithfully with you as you have continued to change and grow. Soon, Pastor Greg will take the next steps with you and you will walk together into your future. But what about this middle space, I wonder if any spaces need to be cleaned out. Where are the spaces that


Special thanks to our team leaders and volunteers for making these meals a great time for food and fellowship.

With pledged giving \$3k over budget, the Rejoice expense share, and expenses under budget, January ended \$20K better than budgeted. What a blessing! There was still a \$10K loss for the month because it was a 3 payperiod month, but there is a \$99.5K profit YTD. A deficit is still projected for the fiscal year, but it should be less than \$50K. Building Fund contributions continue to build to help offset costs of large unexpected repairs that occur as the building ages and to have for deductible coverage as needed.
