## THE MESSENGER







**Adiaphora** – ever since I used that word in a sermon, I've had many inquiries into its meaning. So here is Wikipedia's definition:

Adiaphoron (/ædɪˈæfərɒnı ædiˈæfərɒn/i plural: adiaphorai from the Greek ἀδιάφορον (pl. ἀδιάφορα), meaning "not different or differentiable") is the negation of διαφορά diaphorai "difference".

That's not very helpful is it. Once you know the word comes out of the Greek philosophical tradition, you'll understand why the word and its definition are sort of obscure. Diogenes the Cynic talked about adiaphora 400 years before Christ. Stoicism and Pyrrhonism continued the discussion for another 500 or so years. There is little record of the word being thrown around until the Protestant Reformation of the 16<sup>th</sup> century when guys like Martin Luther and Phillip Melanchthon were stirring the pot.

It seems that for millennia people have disagreeing about what's important (or what's not important). The ancient philosophers argued things like wealth or prestige were adiaphora. Wealth didn't make you a good person and a good person didn't necessarily become wealthy. Wealth didn't matter. Except it did – to the poor and the wealthy – for the wrong reasons. Wealth, or lack thereof, is no indicator or influencer or character. If the goal of society is to produce good people, and the philosophers would argue it is, wealth doesn't matter.

So, what does adiaphora look like in the church?

Adiaphora in the church takes on a more narrow definition. Adiaphora refers to the all the stuff that has no effect on your salvation. That means that anything other than believing that Jesus died for your sins is adiaphora. That means that anything other than loving God and loving others is adiaphora.

Luther argued that man-made traditions were adiaphora. Tradition says you can only sing Christmas songs during the Christmas season which starts on Christmas and ends at Epiphany (January 6). Lutheran tradition insists on singing *A Mighty Fortress* on, and only on, Reformation Day. According to Luther, human traditions are fine as long as they don't distract the congregation from worshipping God. Sometimes, however, those traditions become mighty important to us.

A funny thing happens when these things that don't matter start to matter. We start to give more attention to the things that don't matter than we do to the things that truly matter. Pretty soon the things that matter become secondary to the things that don't matter. Before long, we start to believe that the things that don't matter really do matter. And when that happens, we are no longer worshipping God, we are worshipping the things that don't matter.

We need to be careful and cognizant of the baggage we bring to worship. Ask yourself why you're there. Remember why you're there. And remember this also when you leave the sanctuary. It's about God. It's about love. Nothing else matters.

And now faith, hope, and love remain, these three, and the greatest of these is love. (1st Corinthians 13:13)

### **First Lutheran Elections**

When considering the many giving options available when designing your estate plan, your financial advisor may suggest using a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) or a Donor-Advised Fund (DAF) to accomplish your giving objectives. These may be good options depending on your age, your charitable and financial goals, family needs, estate planning objectives, and desired charitable legacy. Tax benefits, either now or deferred, are also a key factor. Let's look at these two giving strategies...

A Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) allows individuals who are 70 ½ years old or older to donate up to \$105,000 directly from their traditional IRA to a charitable organization. QCD's are tax-free which makes them an attractive option for charitable giving. For those 73 years and older, QCD's also count toward your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) for the year. Your financial advisor can help you set a QCD that distributes funds directly to the charities you care about.

A Donor-Advised Fund (DAF) is a simple, tax-smart way to support favorite charities. It allows you to make an irrevocable charitable contribution to the public institution, receive an immediate tax deduction and then recommend grants from the fund to a variety of charities over time. Plus, any potential investment growth within the account is tax-free, further increasing the charitable impact. Keep in mind that private foundations (think brokerage firms) and donor-advised funds (ie. Fremont Area Community Foundation) are not the same. Be sure to talk with your financial advisor about the differences and if either of these would fulfill your giving objectives.

Finally, estate planning does not need to be complicated. The important thing is that your assets are being administered in a professional manner and your funds are directed to beneficiaries who meet your estate planning goals. In the next few weeks, the Endowment Board will share with you some of the grants that have been recently awarded.
